WINCHESTER NEIGHBORHOOD STATION VACATION CHECK PLEASE!

The Vacation Inspection Program is a service offered to St. Louis County Residents by the St. Louis County Police Department. Upon your request, an officer will check your residence while you are on vacation.

HOW CAN I PARTICIPATE?

You may stop by City Hall and fill out the form during normal business hours.

Have the following information available: Street address Home phone number Date leaving Date returning Is mail delivery going to be stopped?

Basic questions about house (Are there going to be timers? Is there an alarm system? etc...)

Vehicles left behind (Year, Make, Model, Color, License, Location)

Name, address, and phone number of an emergency local contact. Address and phone number where you can be reached (mobile phone number, if available.)

Spring Housecleaning - Easier, Cheaper, and Less Toxic

Commercial household cleaners can be a common source of toxins. Wouldn't you prefer using safer alternatives? By using common ingredients, you can make your own, less-toxic cleaners. And they are inexpensive — some even cheaper than

commercial brands. The benefits are many, including improved air quality in your home, less exposure to harmful chemicals, and fewer waste concerns. Below is a list of the most common ingredients you'll need:

- 1. **Baking Soda** Baking soda cleans, deodorizes, and softens water (increasing its potential for suds, and thus soap's cleaning power). It also serves as a good scouring powder.
- 2. **Borax** Borax cleans, deodorizes, and softens water. It is also an excellent disinfectant. You can find it in the laundry section of most grocery stores.
- 3. Castile Soap Castile soap is a type of soap made entirely from plant-based products. It is non-toxic and it biodegrades safely and completely. It can be found in most grocery stores, drug stores, and health food stores.
- 4. White Vinegar White vinegar cuts grease and freshens.
- 5. **Lemon Juice** Lemon juice, like white vinegar, cuts grease and freshens.

Following are alternatives for common household cleaners. Mix the ingredients and use as you would the commercial alternatives.

- 1. **Basin, Tub, and Tile Cleaner**: Mix ½ cup of baking soda with 2 to 3 tablespoons of liquid castile soap.
- 2. **Disinfectant**: Mix ¼ cup of borax with ½ gallon of hot water.
- 3. **Fabric Softener**: Add 1 cup of vinegar or ¹/₄ cup of baking soda to the wash during its final rinse.
- 4. Floor Cleaner: Mix ½ cup of white vinegar with 1 gallon of warm water.
- 5. Grease Remover: Use borax on a damp cloth.
- 6. **Household Cleaner**: Mix 1 teaspoon of liquid castile soap, 1 teaspoon of borax, and the juice from one lemon in 1 quart of warm water, or mix ½ cup of baking soda, ½ cup of borax, and ½ cup of vinegar in 1 gallon of warm water.
- 7. **Mildew Remover**: Dissolve ½ cup of vinegar and ½ cup of borax in warm water. Apply using a sponge or spray bottle.

8. Toilet Bowl Cleaner: Pour ¼ cup of baking soda into the toilet bowl and drizzle with vinegar. Let sit for ½ hour. Scrub and flush. Add borax to eliminate stains.

9. Window Cleaner: Add 2 teaspoons of vinegar to 1 quart of warm water or

2 tablespoons of borax to 3 cups of water. After using, rub the glass dry with newspaper to avoid streaking.

Note: Make sure that all homemade formulas are well-labeled and kept out of the reach of children.

UNNECESSARY NOISE



Just a reminder about being responsible for your dogs when they are outside. Do not allow them to

continuously bark and thereby disturb the public peace. Any unnecessary noise from "the keeping of any animal or bird which by causing frequent or long continued noise shall disturb the comfort or repose of any persons in the vicinity" is prohibited. If a complaint is made, the pet owner could be summoned to municipal court.

The following information is presented from the stormwater library of the Phase II Stormwater Management Plan which has been initiated by the Federal

Government through the EPA.

NATIVE PLANT RAIN GARDENS



Miniature wetlands reduce stormwater problems and create wildlife habitat. Ever watch your gutter's down spout gush during a heavy rain? According to the Missouri Departments of Conservation and Agriculture, the average Missouri roof sheds tens of thousands of gallons of water a year. You can turn your roof runoff into a refuge for birds, butterflies and dragonflies. You can ease the stress on the local stormwater system by channeling your roof's runoff into a rain garden, which is a miniature wetland!

What about mosquitoes, you ask? Mosquitoes need at least a week of standing water to complete their life cycle. Unless you design your rain garden to hold water, its densely rooted plants will absorb water, preventing the formation of mosquito-friendly puddles. Poorly maintained birdbaths and rain gutters are more likely to serve as mosquito breeding grounds than a rain garden, which attracts mosquito-hungry bats and dragonflies.

Rain gardens should be 10 feet from the foundation and on a gentle slope that catches down spout or sump-pump water. Your rain garden's size should be about one third the size of the roof area providing runoff. Before digging, make sure you won't encounter any utility lines. Dig a 6-8" deep depression, test the overflow pattern by filling the depression with water and watching the overflow. If necessary, dig a shallow channel to direct water away from buildings and toward the street.

Wildlife prefer locally grown native plants. Visit www.grownative.org to find nurseries that specialize in Missouri - grown native plants. After your plants are selected and planted, put a 3-inch layer of untreated, shredded hardwood mulch on the bare soil around the plants to conserve moisture and keep your design neat. Place rocks or garden ornaments in and around your rain garden to add interest. Water every other day for the first few weeks or until it shows growth and good establishment.

A tiny wetland (rain garden) will reduce drainage and flooding problems, keep pollutants out of your local stormwater system, and bring beauty and wildlife to your landscape.

GRASS & WEEDS - The green season is

here and that means it is time to give your lawn mower a workout. Please keep your yard looking neat by mowing your lawn. Property owners or occupants who allow their grass and/or weeds to grow to a height in excess of seven (7) inches are violating a City Ordinance. In addition to keeping your lawn mowed, watch out for those limbs and branches of trees that may be below a height of ten (10) feet above the sidewalk and street. Please keep any tree or shrub trimmed so as not to interfere with persons or vehicles using the street or sidewalk.

Be a responsible neighbor and help not only to promote the beauty and integrity of our City but also to aid in mosquito control and prevention of the West Nile Virus.
