## CANDIDATES FILE FOR OFFICE APRIL 3, 2018 ELECTION

The following persons have filed for office (the names are listed in the order filed with the City Clerk):

The City of Winchester is divided into two Wards known as Ward I and Ward II. The dividing line between Ward I and Ward II shall be a line beginning at the intersection of the center line of Sulphur Springs Road and the eastern prolongation of the south rear property line of Hillcrest Boulevard; thence westwardly along the south rear property line of Hillcrest Boulevard to its intersection with the center line of Lindy Boulevard, thence northwardly along the center line of Lindy Boulevard to its intersection with the center line of Hillcrest Boulevard thence westward along the center line of Hillcrest Boulevard, to its intersection with the southern prolongation of the west rear property line of Lindy Boulevard, thence northwardly along said west rear property line to its intersection with the north rear property line of Hillcrest Boulevard, thence westwardly along said north rear property line to its intersection with the west city limits of the City of Winchester.

Ward I shall constitute all of the area with the boundaries of the City of Winchester that lies South of the above described line dividing Ward I and Ward II.

Ward II shall constitute all of the area within the boundaries of the City of Winchester that lies North of the above described line dividing Ward I and Ward II.

REMINDER - Bulky items are defined as household materials that are too large to fit in with your regular waste collection container and that are not bundled into 4-ft or less bundles. Examples of bulky items: furniture, carpet, old bicycles, and *some* household construction materials. Wood, drywall etc. is limited to (1)-32gallon can per pickup. (Carpet must be bundled 4ft x 2ft or less). Containers may weigh no more than 50 lbs. Bulky items will be picked up at no additional charge, but there is a 2 item limit per week.

In addition, Republic Services still picks up "white goods" - appliances, etc. These also have a limit of 2

items per week at a charge of \$25.00 per item, the cost of which can be charged to the account.

## Reminder: Your toilet is not a trash can!

Cleaning and disinfecting wipes, personal hygiene products, baby wipes... they all are "disposable", so why not flush them down the toilet? Quite simply, because disposing of such items in the toilet, even those labeled "flushable", instead of in the trash causes big problems, both for the Metropolitan St. Louis Sewer District and for homeowners.

Mounds of disposable materials clog sewer lines, pumps and lift stations. They can cause sewer backups and damage plant equipment. Clearing such materials from the wastewater stream is time-consuming and laborintensive. Even detal floss flushed down the toilet can cause problems. Dental floss is very strong and durable. It can get tangled up in pumps and equipment, or worsen minor clogs within pipes by "binding" materials together.

These items are also a big problem for property owners' home plumbing and sewer laterals which are smaller in diameter and more susceptible to clogs. The sewer system is not designed for disposable wipes, dental floss, or similar items. Sewer clogs caused by these items can result in considerable cleanup expense and potential harm to our environment.

Please don't use your toilet as a trash can. Only human waste and toilet paper should be flushed down your toilet. Put everything else in the trash, where it belongs.

GRASS & WEEDS - The growing season is fast approaching – Please keep your yard looking neat by mowing your lawn. Property Owners or occupants who allow their grass and/or weeds to grow to a height in excess of seven inches are in violation of a City Ordinance. Be a responsible neighbor and help to promote the beauty and integrity of our City.

**FAIR HOUSING** - The City of Winchester is committed to Fair Housing for all of its citizens. It is unlawful to discriminate against any person because of race, sex, color, religion,

## **PARK & RECREATION NEWS**

All municipal parks in the City of Winchester shall be closed between the hours of Dusk and 7:00 AM and a person shall not be in the parks during those hours except as authorized by Pavilion or Gazebo permit.

## REBER PARK PAVILION & GAZEBO RESERVATIONS

Reservations for the pavilion and gazebo were available the first business day in February. The facilities may be reserved individually and/or together. Hours are from 7a.m. - 8:00 p.m., April through October. These facilities are great for special functions, family reunions, barbeques, and birthday parties. Restrooms are specifically designated for the parties reserved. Cost to reserve the pavilion is \$45, the gazebo, \$30. residents and non-residents are eligible to reserve the facilities.

2018 BALLFIELDS - not all fields have been caps and lids! assigned... Fields will be available beginning April 2<sup>nd</sup> ... or when the fields are deemed usable by City Hall..until the last week of June each year. Each team is limited to one practice session each week.

## REPUBLIC SERVICES THE RECYCLING BIN'S **DIRTY DOZEN**

Below is the Dirty Dozen hit list of the worst recycling contaminants that must not go in the recycling bin. Please help make "Comingled Recycling" a success by keeping these materials out!

#### 1. **NO Plastic Bags**

Plastic bags are the worst contaminant in the recycling container. Plastic bags can be recycled at various locations if they are clean, dry and empty, such as the grocery store or Wal-Mart.

## **NO Materials in Plastic Bags**

Workers have to slow the conveyor belts to rip open bags that contain recyclables and then add the bag to the heap of bags bound for the landfill. These inefficiencies waste time and money.

#### NO Plastic Lids or Caps 3.

Plastic lids and caps are not recyclable on or off the bottle. They, too, are a non-recyclable plastic without a market.

#### 4. **NO Glass**

Glass can break easily and pose a safety hazard while being separated.

## **NO Non-Recyclable Plastics**

While we have added new plastic items, many plastics are still not recyclable. Plastic lids, Styrofoam® and any other plastics not listed in these guidelines are not recyclable because stable markets do not exist for these materials.

#### **NO Caps or Lids on Containers** 6.

Left on the bottle, caps and lids keep liquid inside the container (see item #7). Please remove and recycle metal caps and jar lids separately. Please throw away plastic

#### **NO Liquids** 7.

When we compact bottles for shipping, liquids drip, splatter and explode all over the floor, creating a sticky stew with a stench. Please completely empty and quickly rinse out all containers before recycling.

## **NO Ceramics or Non-Recyclable Glass**

Ceramic, china, dishes, mirrors, light bulbs, Pyrex® porcelain and window glass should not go in the bin! Their different melting points and chemical compositions will ruin new glass bottles. If our buyer sees just one of these on the top of a load of glass, the entire load could be rejected.

## 9. NO Diapers or Bio-Hazardous Waste

Syringes and needles, diapers and other sanitary products are not recyclable OR compostable.

## 10. NO Hazardous Waste

Hazardous waste such as paint, automotive fluids, car batteries and pesticides must be taken to an approved recycling center.

## 11. NO Scrap Metal

Scrap metal items of any size should not go in your curbside bin. These items cause excessive damage to the recycling equipment.

## 12. NO Frozen Food Boxes

Paperboard boxes that were designed for freezer foods, such as frozen pizza and entrees, have a plastic polymer sprayed on them to protect against freezer burn. That same coating prevents the box from breaking up in the recycling process. These materials are not recyclable OR compostable.

## SLIDING GLASS DOORS AND WINDOWS

Below are some tips that may help you prevent crime. But remember—the most important single act you can do is to call the Police to report crimes or suspicious activities! If law enforcement is not aware of problems, they cannot resolve them. Here are some tips for homeowners to use so that they can help the anticrime effort.

Sliding glass doors present a major security problem if they do not have the proper locks and special steps are not taken to prevent removal of the door. Sliding glass doors can be lifted from the track and removed by pushing in the bottom of the door. To prevent the doorframe from being opened in this manner it is recommended that 1-1/4" pan head sheet metal screws be inserted into the top of the door frame at both ends and in the middle. The screws should be adjusted so that the door barely clears them when it is operated.

Once screws are in place, to prevent the door from being lifted while it is closed, lock the door handle and place a wooden dowel or metal rod in the floor track. This should make your sliding glass door secure. For additional security, a safety film for glass is available. The film is applied to the glass and if the window is ever shattered, the film holds the glass together making entry difficult if not impossible. Call Dispatch at 636-529-8210 to report burglaries, thefts, vandalism, prowlers or suspicious activities.
