The City of Winchester is divided into two Wards known as Ward I and Ward II. The dividing line between Ward I and Ward II shall be a line beginning at the intersection of the center line of Sulphur Springs Road and the eastern > prolongation of the south rear property line of Hillcrest Boulevard; thence westwardly along the south rear property • line of Hillcrest Boulevard to its intersection with the center line of Lindy Boulevard, thence northwardly along the center • line of Lindy Boulevard to its intersection with the center line of Hillcrest Boulevard thence westward along the center line of Hillcrest Boulevard, to its intersection with the southern prolongation of the west rear property line of Lindy Boulevard, thence northwardly along said west rear property line to its intersection with the north rear property line of Hillcrest Boulevard, thence westwardly along said north rear property line to its intersection with the west city limits of the City of Winchester.

Ward I shall constitute all of the area with the boundaries of the City of Winchester that lies South of the above described line dividing Ward I and Ward II.

Ward II shall constitute all of the area within the boundaries of the City of Winchester that lies North of the above described line dividing Ward I and Ward II.

APRIL IS FAIR HOUSING MONTH Fair Housing is Everyone's Business - It applies to both public and private housing. The 1968 Act was amended by the Fair Housing Amendments Act in 1988. Effective 1989; provided additional protected classes. Title VIII means "Don't Discriminate." The Fair Housing Law prohibits discrimination in all housing regardless of ownership or management. Therefore, housing providers should offer the same, require the same, and inform all persons regardless of their race, color, sex, national origin, religion, familiar status (children under 18 years of age) or handicap. TORNADO SIREN POLICY

To help the public prepare for tornado situations, a TORNADO WATCH and TORNADO WARNING program has been developed. A tornado watch means that conditions are favorable for tornado development. This is the time to prepare. You should keep alert by listening to radio, television or weather radio for the latest weather information. A tornado warning means a tornado has been sighted or indicated by radar. When a warning is issued, the sirens will be activated. It is important that local media sources or weather radio be monitored for the duration of the warning. The siren system does not sound an "All Clear" message so please listen to the National Weather Service for this information.

If you get a call *from 877-382-4357*, don't answer it *or* hang up immediately!

Scammers are constantly picking up new phone numbers to spoof, the FTC said. Here are four tips to help you avoid being ripped off:

If you get a strange call from any government phone number, hang up.

If you want to check it out, visit the official (.gov) website for contact information.

Don't give out — or confirm — your personal or financial information to someone who calls.

Don't wire money or send money using a reloadable card. In fact, never pay someone who calls out of the blue, even if the name or number on the caller ID looks legit.

Feeling pressured to act immediately? Hang up. That's a sure sign of a scam.

Even though the first week of March is

National Consumer Protection Week, *Ameren Missouri* is taking this opportunity to remind you of the tricks scammers use to steal money. The goal is to educate customers on how you can guard against becoming a victim of imposter utility scams.

Within the last few months, Ameren has seen an uptick in reported scams across their service territory, specifically targeting small businesses. These scammers are using advanced tactics such as mimicking voice response systems and displaying bogus phone numbers on caller ID, which can be very convincing.

Within the past four years, more than 3,000 Ameren Missouri customers have reported scam activity or have fallen victim to a scam. The majority of those incidents were phone calls from scammers who threaten that customers' services will be disconnected or shut off if they fail to make an immediate payment – typically using a prepaid card or other non-traceable form of payment.

During National Consumer Protection Week, Ameren wants to bring awareness and help customers stay vigilant in preventing scams. The campaign is in alignment with the Utilities United Against Scams collaborative, a group of more than 100 utilities across the nation working together to help stop scams targeting utility customers.

We want all customers to know that we would never pressure anyone for immediate payment over the phone or demand that a specific credit card or phone number be used to make a payment.

Ameren Missouri offers these tips to protect customers against scammers:

- Never give your credit card, debit card, Social Security, ATM, checking or saving account numbers to anyone who calls, sends an email, or comes to your home requesting this information.
- Don't trust anyone asking for immediate payment. If you suspect someone is impersonating an Ameren or any other company's employee, end the conversation and immediately call the company. Legitimate companies do not specify how customers should make a bill payment and always offer a variety of ways to pay a bill. Most companies offer customers payments online, by phone, electronic check, mail or at pay in person locations.

Bats and Wildlife Control Preventing Rabies in People and Pets

Saint Louis County Animal Care & Control is committed to keeping people and pets safe in Saint Louis County. With that said, we share this County with many native wildlife species. In general, wildlife found outdoors should be left alone. Animal Care & Control will respond to remove and test any wild mammal that has had contact with person or pet and could have transmitted rabies through a bite wound. Without the risk of rabies transmission, Animal Care & Control defers calls about wildlife outdoors—as well as in attic, crawl spaces, and other non-living quarters—to the Missouri Department of Conservation, Powder Valley at 314-301-1500 for wildlife control only.

Officers can be routed to you by the County Police Department. Please call the police non-emergency line at (636) 529-8210 and ask for an Animal Control Officer to come to your location. If no one in the house and no pets had contact with the wildlife, and you can safely do so, try to allow the wildlife the opportunity to leave on its own—open doors and windows, turn on lights, and don't stand between them and an exit. If the bat or wildlife DID come into contact with a person or pet in the household, or if you are unsure, KEEP IT CONFINED—Animal Control will remove the wildlife and help you assess your level of risk for disease exposure. To confine a bat, turn all the lights on in the room—this can help to keep the bat from flying around. Keep an eye on its location, so that the Officers can quickly locate and capture it.

The most common species of animals to carry rabies in the State of Missouri are bats and skunks. Bats are the species most commonly found to carry this disease in the Saint Louis Region. A very small number of bats come into contact with people or pets each year and require testing for rabies—less than 3% of those tested Statewide are actually carrying the disease. SNOOPING IN THE TRASH

The United States Supreme Court has ruled that once trash is placed near the curb for disposal, all expectation of privacy has been forfeited by the resident and anyone may legally examine the

contents, including taking any items if they so desire. In other words, it is legal for someone to go through your trash after you place it near the curb for disposal. Therefore, police officials warn residents to be attentive to what they throw away (credit card statements, bank statements, other private information) so that they do not become a victim of identity theft.

All municipal parks in the City of Winchester shall be closed between the hours of Dusk and 7:00 AM

and a person shall not be in the park during those hours except as authorized by permit.



The Pavilion and Gazebo at Reber Park is available for use from **April through October** of each year, 7:00 a.m.- 8:00 p.m.

for special functions, family reunions, barbeques, and birthday parties. The City offers both a pavilion and gazebo available to be reserved individually and/or together. *The cost to reserve the pavilion is \$45*, *the gazebo*, *\$30*. Reservations *must* be made in person; fees are non-refundable. You are encouraged to call City Hall to inquire whether a specific date is available. Both residents and non-residents are eligible to reserve the facilities.

Green infrastructure is cost-effective, sustainable and environmentally friendly because it captures and reuses stormwater to maintain or restore natural hydrologies.
