The City of Winchester is divided into two Wards known as Ward I and Ward II. The dividing line between Ward I and Ward II shall be a line beginning at the intersection of the center line of Sulphur Springs Road and the eastern prolongation of the south rear property line of Hillcrest Boulevard; thence westwardly along the south rear property line of Hillcrest Boulevard to its intersection with the center line of Lindy Boulevard, thence northwardly along the center line of Lindy Boulevard to its intersection with the center line of Hillcrest Boulevard thence westward along the center line of Hillcrest Boulevard, to its intersection with the southern prolongation of the west rear property line of Lindy Boulevard, thence northwardly along said west rear property line to its intersection with the north rear property line of Hillcrest Boulevard, thence westwardly along said north rear property line to its intersection with the west city limits of the City of Winchester.

Ward I shall constitute all of the area with the boundaries of the City of Winchester that lies South of the above described line dividing Ward I and Ward II.

Ward II shall constitute all of the area within the boundaries of the City of Winchester that lies North of the above described line dividing Ward I and Ward II.

# "PARK OF THE MONTH" BUDER PARK

(Part of the St. Louis County Park System)
Buder Park is located on the south bank of the

Meramec River across from Valley Park. The original tract of 140 acres was given to the City of St. Louis in 1918 by Gustavus A. Buder and his wife Lydia for use, primarily as a swimming area with a beach. The city failed to develop the property. As the gift stipulated, the park could be reclaimed if the City did not use it and the heirs reacquired the land from the City. In 1954, G. A. Buder, Jr. deeded the land to the St. Louis County Department of Parks and Recreation and it was named Lydia D. Buder Part of the original land was lost with the Park. construction of Interstate 44 and the park was split into the upper area on the hill south of Interstate 44 now called Buder South and lower area close to the river. In the early 1960's, the radio controlled model plane flying field and a polo field were constructed. Using funds from the 1969 bond issue, Buder South added a picnic shelter, restrooms and a playground. Lower Buder's facilities were also upgraded. Lower Buder rests along the Meramec River and currently features one archery area, three ball diamonds and three soccer fields. Two of the soccer fields are being renovated for use this spring. These facilities have been available since 1972. In the late 1970s and early 1980s additional property was acquired as a result of a FEMA Flood Buyout Program adding an additional 61 acres to the park. Over the years some land west of the park has been added so that Buder now is comprised of 276 acres. Buder Park is included as part of the Meramec River Greenway.

All of the parks highlighted in newsletters so far are within a five (5) mile radius of Winchester. You can go to the St. Louis County website and check out the available parks and events available to the public all year.

# NATIVE PLANT RAIN GARDENS



Miniature wetlands reduce stormwater problems and create wildlife habitat. Ever watch your gutter's down spout gush during a heavy rain? According to the Missouri Departments of Conservation and Agriculture, the average Missouri roof sheds tens of thousands of gallons of water a year.

You can turn your roof runoff into a refuge for birds, butterflies and dragonflies. You can ease the stress on the local stormwater system by channeling your roof's runoff into a rain garden, which is a miniature wetland!

What about mosquitoes, you ask? Mosquitoes need at least a week of standing water to complete their life cycle. Unless you design your rain garden to hold water, its densely rooted plants will absorb water, preventing the formation of mosquito-friendly puddles. Poorly maintained birdbaths and rain gutters are more likely to serve as mosquito breeding grounds than a rain garden, which attracts mosquito-hungry bats and dragonflies.

Rain gardens should be 10 feet from the foundation and on a gentle slope that catches down spout or sump-pump water. Your rain garden's size should be about one third the size of the roof area providing runoff. Before digging, make sure you won't encounter any utility lines. Dig a 6-8" deep depression, test the overflow pattern by filling the depression with water and watching the overflow. If necessary, dig a shallow channel to direct water away from buildings and toward the street.

Wildlife prefer locally grown native plants. Visit www.grownative.org to find nurseries that specialize in Missouri - grown native plants. After your plants are selected and planted, put a 3-inch layer of untreated, shredded hardwood mulch on the bare soil around the plants to conserve moisture and keep your design neat. Place rocks or garden ornaments in and around your rain garden to add interest. Water every other day for the first few weeks or until it shows growth and good establishment.

A tiny wetland (rain garden) will reduce drainage and flooding problems, keep pollutants out of your local storm If you are considering one of these pools, stop by City water system, and bring beauty and wildlife to your landscape.

# PRIVATE SWIMMING POOL PERMITS

Chapter 520 of the Winchester Municipal Code defines a Private Swimming Pool as "Any structure that contains water over twenty-four (24) inches in depth and which is used, or intended to be used, for swimming or recreational bathing and which is available only to the family and guests of the householder. This includes in-ground, above-ground and on-ground swimming pools, hot tubs and spas."

In recent years a number of the new style plastic pools have been installed throughout the city. These provide a great new way for individuals to have the convenience of a private swimming pool; however, even though they are made of plastics, they do fit the definition of a private swimming pool and require a permit.

Hall and pick up a pool permit packet before installation. The total permit fee for above-ground pools eighteen (18) feet or less in diameter is \$35.00.
