The City of Winchester is divided into two Wards known as Ward I and Ward II. The dividing line between Ward I and Ward II shall be a line beginning at the intersection  $\clubsuit$ of the center line of Sulphur Springs Road and the eastern prolongation of the south rear property line of Hillcrest Boulevard; thence westwardly along the south rear property line of Hillcrest Boulevard to its intersection with the center line of Lindy Boulevard, thence northwardly along the center line of Lindy Boulevard to its intersection with the center line of Hillcrest Boulevard thence ¢ westward along the center line of Hillcrest Boulevard, to its intersection with the southern prolongation of the west rear property line of Lindy Boulevard, thence northwardly along said west rear property line to its intersection with  $\clubsuit$ the north rear property line of Hillcrest Boulevard, thence westwardly along said north rear property line to its intersection with the west city limits of the City of Winchester.

Ward I shall constitute all of the area with the boundaries of the City of Winchester that lies South of the above described line dividing Ward I and Ward II.

Ward II shall constitute all of the area within the SPRING CLEANING?.....Commercial household boundaries of the City of Winchester that lies North of the above described line dividing Ward I and Ward II.

- Watch what you say; if you wouldn't say it in person, DON'T say it on-line.
- Stay safe; keep personal information personal, share your phone number, address, etc. only with friends you've met face to face and trust.
- Break the chain; passing along hurtful or unkind messages - even as a joke - is NEVER okay.
- Don't take it; you can block offensive message senders, delete messages from unfamiliar addresses or report them to your electronic service provider.
- Ask for help if you know cyber bullying is going on, talk about it with a trusted adult, parent, teacher or co-worker.

cleaners can be a common source of toxins in your home. By using common ingredients already found in many kitchens, you can make your own, less-toxic cleaners. They are usually inexpensive, and natural alternatives can improve air quality in your home and GRASS & WEEDS - The growing season is fast waste concerns.

> Six of the most common ingredients you will need for these safer clean recipes: baking soda, borax (found in the laundry section of most grocery stores), castile soap (found in most grocery and health food stores and made entirely from plant-based products), washing soda, white vinegar and lemon juice.

Following are a few alternative recipes for common Detailed information and registration forms are available at household cleaners:

Floor Cleaner: Mix <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup white vinegar with 1 gallon of warm water.

**Bathroom Cleaner:** Mix <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup of baking soda with 2 to 3 tablespoons of liquid castile soap.

**Disinfectant:** Mix 1/4 cup of borax with  $\frac{1}{2}$  gallon of hot water.

Drain Cleaner: First use a plunger. If this does not work, mix  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup of baking soda with  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup of vinegar and pour into the drain. Let it sit for several minutes, then pour 2 quarts of boiling water down the drain. Caution: never use this method if commercial drain cleaners have already been used on a clog.

Grease Remover: Use borax on a damp cloth.

Mildew Remover: Dissolve  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup of vinegar and  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup of borax in warm water. Apply using a sponge or spray bottle.

Window Cleaner: Add 2 teaspoons of vinegar to 1 quart of warm water or add 1 tablespoon of borax to 3 cups of water. After using, rub the glass dry with newspaper to avoid streaking.

Make sure that all homemade formulas are welllabeled and kept out of the reach of children.

#### **PARK & RECREATION NEWS**

All municipal parks in the City of Winchester shall be closed between the hours of Dusk and 7:00 AM and a person shall not be in the park during those hours except as authorized by permit.

The Pavilion and Gazebo at Reber Park is available for use from April through

October of each year, 7:00 a.m.- 9:30 p.m. for special functions, family reunions, barbeques, and birthday parties. The City offers both a pavilion and gazebo available to be reserved individually and/or together. The cost to reserve the pavilion is \$45, the gazebo, \$30.

Reservations *must* be made in person; fees are nonrefundable. You are encouraged to call City Hall to inquire whether a specific date is available. Residents and non-residents are eligible to reserve the facilities.

HOUSING INSPECTIONS - The City

Winchester requires a housing inspection whenever a change in occupancy or ownership occurs. So, whether you decide to rent, sell your home, or move out and have other family members move in, an application for a housing inspection must be completed, you must pay the \$70.00 inspection fee, schedule the inspection and arrange for an adult to be present during the inspection.

An *occupancy permit* is required for all residents before they move into their home and an approved inspection must be on file before the occupancy permit can be issued. Occupancy Permits are \$10.00 and upon application, we provide useful information to the new resident.

(Municipal Code Section 515.070)



**BUILDING PERMITS** - Play it safe and check we City Hall before you start your improvement project. *Remember, a permit must be secured <u>before construction</u> <u>begins</u> or your permit is subject to doubling. Winchester permits may be required for many projects including, but not limited to:* 

° new home construction	° home additions
° re-hab existing structures	° patio covers
° retaining walls over 4 ft.	° glass enclosures
° excavations	° monuments
° sheds	° demolitions
° garage/carports and/or	° decks
garage/carport additions	° pools & hot tubs
° basement finishing or	° fences

## If you doubt whether a permit is required for a particular project, call City Hall for clarification.

In addition, **St. Louis County** requires the issuing and displaying of permits, before starting work, for the following:

**FAIR HOUSING** - The City of Winchester is committed to Fair Housing for all of its citizens. It is unlawful to discriminate against any person because of race, sex, color, religion,

The following information is presented from the storm water library of the Phase II Storm water Management Plan which has been initiated by the Federal Government through the EPA.

MSD alone cannot keep the region's waterways clean.

They need the support, resources and actions of concerned citizens, businesses and municipalities to improve local water quality. Since waterways and sewers are shared public resources, there are many steps that you can take to help maintain both.

Prior to urban development, rain provided nourishment to a natural landscape of forests and wetlands. With development, we replaced these forests and wetlands with buildings and pavement, sending stormwater into sewer pipes, ditches, culverts and outfalls. This stormwater runoff carries pollutants into our local streams and rivers, damaging local ecosystems and watershed health and threatening our public health and includes in-ground, above-ground and on-ground quality of life.

This is where "going green" can help. Green infrastructure is cost-effective, sustainable and environmentally friendly because it captures and reuses stormwater to maintain or restore natural hydrologies.

Examples of green infrastructure include rain gardens, porous pavements, green roofs, infiltration planters, trees and tree boxes and rainwater harvesting (rain barrels). For more information see www.stlmsd.com.

#### FROM THE DESK OF THE CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICER

Most of us are very glad winter is essentially over. The harsh winter weather has taken a toll on property as well as people.

Spring is the time for assessing the damage that winter **•** has caused to the exterior of our homes; i.e., is there any rotting wood, is there any loose siding, does the siding have flaking or peeling paint, is all the calking in good shape, are the gutters clean and securely attached? *City* codes mandate these things be addressed; however, even if they didn't, homeowners can do a lot to prevent declining property values by making the necessary repairs, keeping the grass cut and keeping the exterior of their property free of items that are not customarily used or stored outside.

#### PRIVATE SWIMMING POOL PERMITS

Chapter 520 of the Winchester Municipal Code defines a Private Swimming Pool as "Any structure that contains water over twenty-four (24) inches in depth and which is used, or intended to be used, for swimming or recreational bathing and which is available only to the family and guests of the householder. This

swimming pools, hot tubs and spas."

In recent years a number of the new style plastic pools have been installed throughout the city. These provide a great new way for individuals to have the convenience of a private swimming pool; however, even though they are made of plastics, they do fit the definition of a private swimming pool and require a permit. If you are considering one of these pools, stop by City Hall and pick up a pool permit packet before installation. The total permit fee for above-ground pools eighteen (18) feet or less in diameter is \$35.00.

#### **TORNADO SIREN POLICY**

To help the public prepare for tornado situations, a TORNADO WATCH and

TORNADO WARNING program has been developed. A tornado watch means that conditions are favorable for tornado development. This is the time to prepare. You should keep alert by listening to radio, television or weather radio for the latest weather information. A tornado warning means a tornado has been sighted or indicated by radar. When a warning is issued, the sirens will be activated. It is important that local media sources or weather radio be monitored for the duration of the warning. The siren system does not sound an "All Clear" message so please listen to the National Weather Service for this information.
