**WINCHESTER NEIGHBORHOOD STATION
FIREWORKS**

Chapter 810 of the St. Louis County Code governing fireworks states that it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to sell, possess, offer for sale, expose for sale, give, use, discharge or explode fireworks within St. Louis County. *In other words, it is illegal to possess fireworks in St. Louis County.*



The following is informational material presented by MSD's *Project Clear* program to raise awareness of the complexity of the wastewater collection and treatment system servicing the greater St. Louis area.

Install a rain barrel

A rain barrel is a great "low-tech" way to tap into a free supply of water that would otherwise drain into the sewer system.

Any homeowner can do it! You simply install a large drum below the down spout of a gutter to catch the rainwater runoff from your roof. A standard 55-gallon

rain barrel can fill in a matter of minutes during a strong rainstorm. Most come with a spigot for filling watering cans and a connection for a soaker hose, making it easy for you to use the water you collect to irrigate your lawn, water your plants or wash your car.

This small one-time investment will lower your water bills for years to come!

Rainwater is good for your lawn and plants. Rainwater is fresh, naturally soft and low in salt and chlorine, making it great for nourishing plants or landscape during the dry summer months.

By capturing this water as it falls, rain barrels minimize runoff pollutants and protect everyone's water supply. Rainwater picks up fertilizer, oil, pesticides and other contaminants as it travels over hard surfaces and lawns into storm sewers. Here in St. Louis, some of this water flows directly into streams, lakes and other bodies of water, where it can impact water quality.

In short, rain barrels can save money, improve the vitality of plants and help protect the environment.

The City of Winchester has a LEASH LAW - Neither dogs nor cats are permitted to run at large. Any pet must be on a leash, in an enclosed area, or properly restrained.

For the safety and enjoyment of all Winchester residents, City Hall encourages dog and cat owners to be responsible and leash or confine pets whenever outside.

(Municipal Code Section 205.190)

UNNECESSARY NOISE

In recent months there have been complaints about people not being responsible for making sure that when their dogs are outside, they not be allowed to continuously bark and thereby disturb the public peace. Dogs are not the only problem, *people cutting grass*, loud music, operation of any motor vehicle unmuffled or causing screeching of tires, yelling, shouting, etc. *all are unnecessary noises and if a complaint is made, the offender is subject to penalty, particularly between the hours of 11 P.M. and 7 A.M.*

YES!, CARTONS ARE RECYCLABLE!: Now the last drop of milk, juice or soup do not mark the end of a carton's useful life. Cartons are easy to recycle and in high demand. Simply place empty cartons in your recycling bin with your plastic, metal and glass containers. Bales of recycled cartons are shipped to paper mills where cartons are mixed with water in a gigantic blender to extract all the paper fiber. Paper fibers are included in cardboard, newspapers, magazines, junk mail, phone books, office paper and folders. These recycled carton paper fibers are valuable resource for making products such as recycled paper products and even building materials.

PLASTIC BAGS 101 - Why can't they be recycled curbside, *even if they have a recycling symbol on them?* Plastic bags are the most common contaminant and, if missed, end up wound around equipment, resulting in a system shutdown. Plastic grocery bags can be recycled at most grocery stores. Look for the drop-off container at the front of the store. If you need a liner in your recycling bin or to contain shredded paper, please use a paper bag - paper bags are 100% recyclable!

Also, a reminder from Republic Services regarding *aluminum cans*. As you all know, the City of Winchester has long been encouraging all of our residents to participate in single stream recycling. Republic Services has let us know that there is a problem when aluminum cans are crushed before pitching into the recycle bin. The facilities are having a problem in that the crushed aluminum cans are not making it through the sorting processes. The flattened can may slip through the cracks of the recycling system. *Republic Services is asking that all residents stop crushing the cans*. They realize it will not completely stop the problem, but they would appreciate any help you give.
