ORDINANCE # 1074 - An ordinance amending Chapter 340 of the Municipal Code adding Section 340.245 regarding **Residential Parking of Commercial Vehicles - Prohibited.**

This ordinance is to clarify that commercial vehicles including, but not limited to tow trucks, being stored or parked overnight in a residential district is prohibited. This is effective as of the Board meeting held September 12, 2018.

At this time there will be a 30 day grace period during which no tickets will be issued to current drivers to give the Board of Aldermen a chance to consider the possibility of issuing 2-3 exemptions to the ordinance. If issued, the current tow truck drivers may continue under that exemption until changes in location or equipment occurs. *No further exemptions will be issued.*

The following information is presented from the Home Safety Handbook of the St. Louis County Police Department.....

BURGLARY Q & A

Although no two burglaries are exactly alike, here are some general answers to frequently asked questions:

Q. What time of day do most burglaries occur?
A. It is traditionally thought that most burglaries occur in the middle of the night. The truth is, burglaries are occurring at all times during the day and night. Whenever you are away from your home, your house is vulnerable.

Q. What property is most often taken during burglaries?
A. The items taken most frequently in residential burglaries are money, jewelry, guns and small electronic equipment.

Q. How is entry gained in most burglaries?
A. Even with the increasing concerns over crime in America, the sad truth is that most entries are made through unlocked doors and windows.

Q. Is it safer to answer my door when I am not expecting guests or just ignore the person?
A. Always acknowledge you are home. (This does not necessarily mean open the door.) Remember, a burglar is looking for an empty house. If you do not answer the door he may think the house is empty and attempt to enter. If someone is outside your house and you feel threatened, immediately dial 911.



The following information is presented from the library of MSD Project Clear, a municipal public education project.

PROPER LEAF DISPOSAL - Falling leaves announce Autumn's arrival; however, they can create problems.... problems that the City needs your help in preventing. We ask residents to consider the following:
Leaves and/or other debris filling storm sewers cause the sewers not to function well

and can lead to unnecessary flooding. This is the reason why placing leaves out onto the street is strictly prohibited.... leaves end up in storm sewers!

Leaf disposal is available through the Solid Waste Disposal Company's yard waste program. Yard waste removal costs are included with your normal Solid Waste bill. All you have to do is rake or gather the yard waste, put it in marked containers or yard waste bags, and set out at the curb no sooner than 24-hours before pick up day.

2018 Campaign

This year's FPW campaign, "Look. Listen. Learn. Be aware. Fire can happen anywhere": works to educate people about three basic but essential steps to take to reduce the likelihood of having a fire—and how to escape safely in the event of one:

"LOOK" for places fire could start. Take a good look around your home. Identify potential fire hazards and take care of them.

"LISTEN" for the sound of the smoke alarm. You could have only minutes to escape safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Go to your outside meeting place, which should be a safe distance from the home and where everyone should know to meet.

"LEARN" two ways out of every room and make sure all doors and windows leading outside open easily and are free of clutter.

Allied Waste Services (Republic Services) is Winchester's Solid Waste Collection Services Contractor. The contract provides the following basic services to every home in Winchester at a cost of \$19.68/month (\$17.71/month) billed quarterly **beginning October 1st**. There is a 10% discount for Senior Citizens with proof of age being 65 years or older.

Trash, yard waste and recycle collection are all on Thursday.

REBER PARK PAVILION & GAZEBO RESERVATIONS

Gazebo and Pavilion reservations are possible through the month of October. At the time of this newsletter, the month of October is open for both structures individually, or together, from 7:00 a.m. - 8:00 p.m. Consider reserving them for special functions, family reunions, barbeques, and birthday parties. *The cost to reserve the pavilion is \$45, the gazebo, \$30.* Residents and non-residents alike are eligible to reserve the facilities. HAVE A PROBLEM DISPOSING OF LEFTOVER PAINT?..... Consider the following suggestions: buy only what you need; blend similar colors of latex paint to use as a base coat for larger



jobs.

Here are options for the proper disposal of leftover paint:

- *Oil-based paint* should be recycled through the County's hazardous household waste program
- *Latex paint* should be air dried in a safe location away from children and pets. Larger volumes of latex paint can be mixed in with absorbent material such as shredded paper or kitty litter. Once latex paint is solidified all the way through, it can be safely placed in the trash.

This information is being passed on to our residents to provide information and to let you know what is being done in the region to address a potential service disruption. *Recycling is not going away*, but this is a period of big change in the global recycling industry.

For a number of years, China provided an eager market for single-stream materials but that began to change as China implemented tougher environmental policies to deal with their pollution problems. For recyclables, this set contamination standards from 10% to .5% and took effect very shortly after they were announced. A long-standing market for a large percentage of single-stream recycling disappeared essentially overnight. The loss of the China market has contributed to one of this region's major recycling processors, Resource Management, announcing a halt to accepting residential single-stream recyclables after October 31st. As a result, Republic Services will have to purchase a new facility, install Single Stream lines and try to reach the 99.5% efficiencies.

Help is requested (and required) by residents to make this work. It is costing about \$98 to process a ton of recycling and the material is selling for \$20 a ton and that fluctuates weekly. As you see, it would be easier to put it in a landfill, but that is not the right thing to do.

Following are revised guidelines of the "Dirty Dozen":

1. NO Plastic Bags

Plastic bags are the worst contaminant in the recycling container. Plastic bags can be recycled at various locations if they are clean, dry and empty, such as the grocery store or Wal-Mart.

2. NO Materials in Plastic Bags

Workers have to slow the conveyor belts to rip open bags that contain recyclables.

3. NO Shredded Paper and Other Small Items

Shredded paper and other small items often become litter before reaching the recycling center. Once there, they fall through the cracks of sorting machines and stick to belts and contaminate properly sorted material.

4. NO Scrap Metal

Scrap metal such as steel, brass, iron and aluminum cause excessive damage to recycling equipment. Take scrap metal to a scrap metal dealer or recycling center.

5. NO Hazardous Household Materials

Paint, automotive fluids, household cleaners and the like must be disposed of properly.

6. NO Flattened Bottles or Cans

For instance, soda cans must be pitched in without flattening them.

7. NO Non-recyclable Plastics

Loose plastic lids, Styrofoam and other plastic may not be recyclable.

8. NO Caps/Lids on Glass Bottles or Jars

Metal lids can be removed and recycled loose in the bin or card. Throw away plastic lids and caps from glass bottles and jars.

9. NO Liquids or Food

When bottles are compacted for shipping, liquids drip and splatter, creating a sticky, smelly mess. Empty and quickly rinse all containers before recycling.

10. NO Non-recyclable Glass

Glassware, ceramics, Pyrex baking dishes, light bulbs, fluorescent lamps, window glass and mirrors cannot be recycled.

11. NO Rope-like Items

Water hoses, holiday lights, leather belts, etc., should not go in curbside bins or carts. These items wrap around machines.

12. NO Diapers or Bio-Hazardous Waste
such as syringes and needles, diapers and other sanitary products.

TREE TRIMMING

It's a good time to check on whether or not your property could use tree trimming. In Winchester, property owners with trees along the right-of-way should have branches *no lower than 10'* above the pavement. *Winter, when the trees are dormant*, is the best time to trim. With spring growth following soon after, fresh wounds are exposed for the shortest time. It is good to remove the lowest branches that interfere with streets or routine yard maintenance. Try to maintain a trunk without branches for the first 10-15 feet. Remember to keep those shrubs and hedges in the front yard trimmed so they do not encroach into the right-of-way and block the view of traffic. Any limbs should be bundled in sections *no longer than four feet* and put at the curb for yard waste pickup.
